

Using Copyrighted Materials in LibGuides, Posters, Signs, Plasma Screens Slides and Presentations.

When using copyrighted work in your LibGuides, posters, signs, plasma screens slides and presentations, it is important to make sure you have permission to use the work and also give proper attribution to the work being used.

It is encouraged to use images and graphics that have a creative commons license or are in the public domain. If an image or graphic does not have a creative commons licenses or similar copyright license, you will need to obtain permission to use the image. Check the “Terms of Use” statement from the website of the rights holder to find out if permission is necessary to use the image. The “Terms of Use” section generally includes information on how to request permission to use the work.

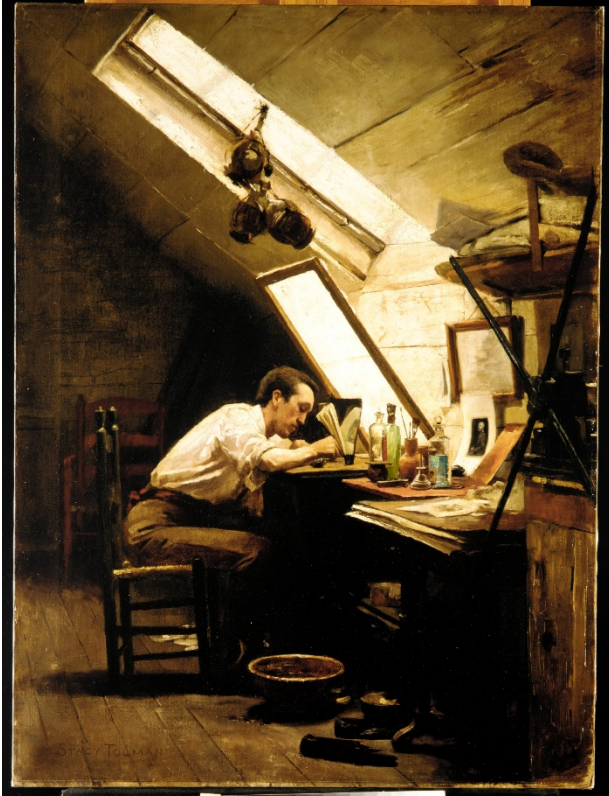

Example:

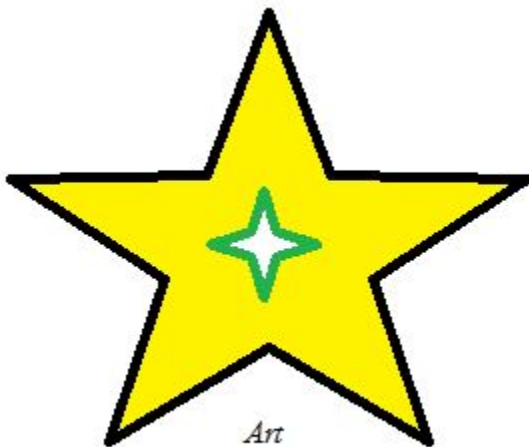
